

Our Journey of Renewal 1st Sunday of Lent

There is a time and season when we must stop and recall From The Desk Of the story of the journey of faith. The spirits of our ancestors remind us of God's presence in their lives and our present lives. The Lenten journey is a time and season for us to realize God's abiding presence in our daily lives. A God who is always there with us.

Our story is a living story that continues to reveal a God who is an intimate part of this ongoing living story. The moments of our joy and victory, God is there. The moments of our sorrow and defeat, God is there. In the dark moments of our lives, God is there to shine the light of hope. How do we know? The stories of our ancestors remind us of how God was there in the same moments of their lives.

Like our ancestors who cried out to the Lord, as they went through the dark times of oppression and misery. It was the Lord who heard their cries and delivered them with his mighty hand and outstretched arm, with signs and wonders. The Lord who did these things for our ancestors then, does this for us today, in our present reality. It is entering into the story that we are intimately bound to our ancestors and God.

St. Paul reminds us that a person seeking salvation must acknowledge "Jesus is Lord." Our faith story helps to recall that Jesus is the "Rock on Which We Stand." The fire of faith that fuels hope in our lives empowers us to call on the name of the Lord knowing that we experience the saving power of his love. Jesus demonstrates this in Luke's gospel when the devil tempted Jesus in the desert. There is power in love of Jesus.

The power of Jesus' love enables us to renew ourselves and remain faithful to this journey of salvation. Jesus' victory over temptation is an important teaching for our way to God. We can remain faithful, knowing we cannot be bought, controlled, or manipulated. Let us stop, renewing ourselves through the story of God's presence and the power of his love in our lives.

BAPTISM GUIDELINES:

Newborn – 6 years old. A parent or legal guardian and godparent(s) must attend a Baptism preparation class, instruction materials are provided.

Ages 7 - 10: The child must attend special Baptism preparation classes and the parent(s) or legal guardian and godparent(s) must attend a Baptism preparation session prior to the ceremony.

Ages 11 - 17: The young person must enroll in the Rite of Christian Initiation for Children (RCIC) program.

Age 18 and Older: The Candidate must enroll in the Rite of Christian Initiation for Adults (RCIA) program.

MATRIMONY – Engaged couples, seeking to be married at the Rock Church, must meet with the Pastor before setting a date.

RCIA/RCIC - ARE YOU SOMEONE OR DO YOU KNOW SOMEONE WHO ...

- Has expressed an interest in becoming Catholic?
- Has a child over the age of seven who has not been • baptized?
- Was baptized Catholic as a child, but has not celebrated the Sacraments of Confirmation and Eucharist?

We offer an opportunity to come together in a group to learn more about the Catholic Faith. Sessions focus on the teachings and experience of the Church and prepare individuals to celebrate the Sacraments of Baptism, Confirmation, and Eucharist. There are separate sessions for children and youth. You are welcome to participate in the process with your questions, insights and your faith story in a warm accepting setting.

LITURGY NOTES

Prayer, Fasting, and Almsgiving

"Grant, almighty God, through the yearly observances of holy Lent, that we may grow in understanding of the riches hidden in Christ." The collect for the First Sunday of Lent provides a framework for thinking about the Lenten practices of prayer, fasting, and almsgiving: we aren't doing these things for God, but it is God who desires to do something for us through these practices.

Prayer is simply conversation with God. We listen to him and discern where he is leading us. We respond with utter vulnerability, and we share our honest reactions and deepest longings. When we are in love, we tend to do what makes our partner happy and avoid doing things that make them unhappy. So it is with God. Out of love, we recognize that communion with him in prayer will transform our minds and our hearts, leading us to think differently about ourselves, others, and the world.

Fasting, too, is a tool that can conform us to Christ. Whether it be "giving up" particular foods, drinks, or behaviors, going without creates a space for us to sit with our deepest appetites. What is it that I truly crave? Companionship? Understanding? What is holding me back from surrendering all to Christ? In the end, we recognize that fast- ing is not about a diet plan so much as it is about becoming more like Jesus by creating intentional space for the Lord to dwell.

The last of three Lenten practices is a complement to fasting: Almsgiving. Lent is not simply a season to give things up; we also share what we have with others. From God's abundance, we have received, and in a spirit of charity, we generously show the same mercy and love to our brothers and sisters. What is of most value to me? Do I generously share what God has given me with others (time, talent, treasure)?

Prayer, fasting, and almsgiving are all remedies for sin. Like the Spirit that leads Christ into the desert, we, too, mindful of our own baptism, are drawn into these spiritual practices and a time of intentional reflection so that we might live for God alone. He desires to accomplish his work in us.

Deuteronomy 26:10


This line from the Old Testament offers two challenges. First, do you give to God from your "first fruits" - the first and best you have to offer? Or do you give from what you have leftover? Second, do you realize that everything you have and that everything you have been given to you by God? We aren't owners of anything, we are merely stewards of God's gifts. Pray for a grateful and generous heart, every day, in all circumstances.

Missionary Discipleship – Time to Pray and Fast

In the Gospel reading today, we hear how Jesus went off alone in the desert for 40 days to pray and fast. This is a perfect opportunity for us to reflect on our busy lives filled with constant noise to determine how we can disconnect and take time alone in conversation with God. As adopted sons and daughters of God, we have been called to give of ourselves in many ways, but when we give, we also have to take time to replenish our spiritual resources. If we don't do this, we will find ourselves empty. Throughout the Gospels we see many examples of Jesus taking time for silent mental prayer. That is what allowed Him to withstand the temptation of the devil in the desert. That is also what helped Him to endure His great suffering. Jesus stayed in a personal relationship with His Father and He trusted that His Father would be with Him throughout all of His tribulation. We, like Jesus, need to maintain our personal relationship with God and remember as Paul shared in his letter to the Romans, "(God) enriches all who call upon Him."


