

Giving the Best of Myself 32nd Sunday in Ordinary Time

I firmly believe that all of us have the ability to give From The Desk Of the best of ourselves to the world and society we live in. You and I struggle and strive to be the best version of ourselves that we can be. Why, we ask? God provides us with the answer in Genesis, chapter one: "Let us create humanity in our image. In his image, he created us." "On the seventh day, God looked at what he

created and said that it was very good." God is saying this to each of us. Hear it! Feel it! Own it! We can now do what Psalm 145 tells us: "My soul, praise the Lord." With whom do we commit our trust and lives? Is it the world, or is it the Lord? The prophet Elijah seeks assistance from a poor woman whose generosity and aid are rewarded by God. She knows, just as we know from our elders, "God always provides." The prophet knows this in the depths of his soul and is insistent, even demanding. The poor woman trusts Elijah's words and extends her generosity; in return, her needs are met.

Paul, in Hebrews, reminds us when Christ comes again it will not be to deal with sin but to reward with salvation those who are waiting for him. This does not mean we are sitting down waiting for the trumpet blasts, the angels to come down from heaven singing. It is a call to be busy proclaiming the Good News of Jesus Christ with the way we live our lives in this world and our society here and now. We are willing to give to worthwhile causes, but are we willing to get involved ourselves? We find it easier to talk about social justice and civil rights, but are we willing to commit ourselves to getting involved to do something about it? We are called to be involved in a committed way to bring about change to unjust systems in our society that allow the defenseless to be mistreated.

Jesus' witness gives us a prime example of offering oneself to the Father in heaven. Jesus's understanding of giving is not about our possessions. The widow provides the best of herself with generosity and humility. God is more interested in receiving ourselves than in receiving a portion of our possessions. The woman in the gospel came before God and offered her best, which symbolized her offering to him. Let each of us take advantage of the opportunity we have been given and give the best of ourselves to God.

BAPTISM GUIDELINES:

Newborn – 6 years old. A parent or legal guardian and godparent(s) must attend a Baptism preparation class, instruction materials are provided.

Ages 7 - 10: The child must attend special Baptism preparation classes and the parent(s) or legal guardian and godparent(s) must attend a Baptism preparation session prior to the ceremony.

Ages 11 – 17: The young person must enroll in the Rite of Christian Initiation for Children (RCIC) program.

Age 18 and Older: The Candidate must enroll in the Rite of Christian Initiation for Adults (RCIA) program.

MATRIMONY - Engaged couples, seeking to be married at the Rock Church, must meet with the Pastor before setting a date.

RCIA/RCIC - ARE YOU SOMEONE OR DO YOU KNOW SOMEONE WHO...

- Has expressed an interest in becoming Catholic?
- Has a child over the age of seven who has not been baptized?
- Was baptized Catholic as a child, but has not celebrated the Sacraments of Confirmation and Eucharist?



LITURGY NOTES

A Lesson in Black Catholic History

Did you know that the first black people in what is now the United States were Catholics? In the first European-style city



established here in 1566, St. Augustine, Florida, a large percentage of Spanish-speaking black Catholic families lived. Some of these were free blacks, and some were slaves. In 1781, El Pueblo de La Reina de los Angeles (today just "Los Angeles") was founded with only 11 families. All were Catholic, over half were black, and there were only 2 whites in the entire group! In 1789, the famous Catholic bishop John Carroll wrote, "Of 15,000 Catholics in Maryland, 3,000 are black Catholic slaves." The original founder of the city of Chicago (established in 1837) was a black Catholic French-speaking trader and trapper named John Baptiste duSable.

Three of the Healy brothers, born in Georgia, were the first black Catholic priests in the United States. James Healy, a member of the Society of St. Sulpice, was ordained in 1854 — the year Augustus Tolton was born. His brother Alexander also joined the Society and was ordained in 1858. Their brother Patrick entered the Jesuits and was ordained in France in 1862. James became the second bishop of Portland, Maine, in 1875 — the first black bishop in the United States. Patrick was the first black university president when he became the head of Georgetown College in 1874. Sadly, he always felt unable to talk about his African ancestry in his community. After the Civil War, Patrick Healy was instrumental in developing the college into Georgetown University.

Henriette DeLille (died 1862), a descendant of slaves, is the first native-born African American whose cause for canonization has been opened by the Roman Catholic Church. In 1836, she and another woman tried to form an integrated congregation of vowed women religious, but the segregation laws of the state of Louisiana made it nearly impossible. In 1842, they began by forming a pious union. They took vows in 1852 and were recognized as a religious congregation by Rome in 1870. It was not until 1872 that they were allowed to wear a religious habit, however, due to racist attitudes toward the Sisters of the Holy Family. Today 250 Sisters of the Holy Family minister in four states as well as in Belize, Central America.


Missionary Discipleship - Service
